



New policy VE11: Archaeology

“Development proposals that may impact on the following non-designated archaeological sites located, shown on the map adjacent, must respect the site as a heritage asset. Development will not be supported unless developers can demonstrate that an alternate location is not possible. If development is essential, the area to be disturbed will first be subject to a full archaeological survey, the results of which must be published.”

- ✓ Some important sites discovered in recent times, eg Roman Villa opposite Blacksmith’s Corner.
- ✓ Excavations at Tuppers Field showed how important archaeological surveys are before planning consent is given.
- ✓ The exact route of the original Roman Road has been discovered via the LIDAR survey.

Archaeological sites

- ❶ Land at Hundred House Copse being the location of an Iron Age earthworks and, in the same area, the suspected Anglo-Sussex Moot Mound.
- ❷ The site of a medieval tile kiln in the field opposite the Black Horse Public House.
- ❸ The route of the Roman Road as identified by the 2016 LIDAR survey.
- ❹ The Archaeological Notification Area (DWS 8478) on the east side of Yapton Lane opposite Blacksmith’s Corner.
